

FROM FR. MIKE

We are one day away from Christmas and it's probably hard to stay in the waiting / preparing spirit of Advent, but we have to try. Today the Church presents Readings that remind us again of the centuries of waiting of the Israelites until the coming of the Messiah. God's plan of salvation, of coming in the flesh as our Emmanuel, surprised everyone, even the Virgin Mary, as we saw when the Angel Gabriel addressed her. The Blessed Mother is the model for faith because she trusted God's will and His goodness even when presented with what seemed impossible.

Being sinless and in perfect relationship to God did not mean that the Virgin Mary was never afraid, surprised, or even anxious. When the Angel Gabriel appeared, the Gospel says she was greatly troubled at the greeting and Gabriel said: "Do not be afraid." Next came the prophecy of Simeon about Jesus and the sword that would pierce her heart which caused her to be amazed. When she couldn't find Jesus for three days, she said: "Son why have you done this to us? Your father and I have been looking for you with great anxiety" and He said to them: "Why were you looking for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" But they did not understand what He said to them.

The Virgin Mary was not all-knowing or all-powerful nor immune from challenges in this life, sinless though she was. She was greatly troubled, surprised, anxious, amazed, and frightened. At times she did not understand what the Lord was doing in a specific situation. Is the Queen of All Saints relatable to us?

There is something different though about how Mary related to God in the face of uncertainties which we can understand perhaps best by contrast. The first sin, and every other sin, shows distrust in God's goodness and love. Adam and Eve had walked with God in innocence and justice, manifest by their nakedness without shame. Satan deceived them into questioning God's love for them. The effect of sin on us is that we hide from God in shame. But a cause of sin is a doubt in God's goodness.

The Virgin Mary never doubted God's goodness, ever. She was innocent and trusting in the Lord's plan so that when she asked questions of the Angel or of Jesus it is purely to understand God's will so that she could follow it better. When she encountered something that surprised her, she pondered what God was revealing to her and interpreted it through a lens of confidence in the Lord, thinking: "God is all good and loving, this troubling thing is part of His plan. He will reveal it to me as I'm ready."

We can have a similar confidence. Christ has won for us a relationship with His Father that we've received at baptism like what the Virgin Mary has. When life's crosses or trials cause us to question and ask why is this happening, the Virgin Mary reminds us that

the good Lord has a plan. He's with us and He will show us in time if we have trust and faith as she did. The Lord's promises may seem delayed in coming but He is faithful to His promises. He has come to save us.

May it be done unto me according to thy word."


2024 PARISH WALL CALENDARS



Second-Graders Receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation

December 14th was a big day for our second-grade students in the school and in the Religious Education program – they made their first confession. Children received a votive candle (battery-operated) to take home to use each night as they perform a daily examination of conscience. They are learning to "Review their day with Jesus" by asking "What am I thankful for? What could I have done better? What will I ask of Jesus?"

The administration of sacraments does not come to fruition by the efforts of one person, one Religious Education Coordinator, one priest. It truly takes a village. The evening Penance Service was the culmination of efforts by a cadre of parents, parishioners, staff and clergy, working together to pass on our rich Catholic faith.

For this sacrament, the leading effort of course is provided by our dedicated catechists, Mrs. Gilda Rivero and Mrs. Mary Ellen Gold, who focused not only on the transactional side of receiving the sacraments, but also on evangelizing - - helping the children to see Jesus and His boundless mercy in the confessing of transgressions. Our Music Director arranged for a musician, Fr. Leo arranged for three other priests to hear confessions along with our parish priests, and Fr. Mike led the service. Rebecca Gold and Dr. Hillman warmly welcomed parents and slightly nervous 2nd graders at the sign-in tables.

Lourdes Younus (choir member and RE catechist aid) and Gloria Spychalski (Arts & Environment) happened to be in the church while we were setting up for the evening Penance Service and jumped in to help, as did Alexandra Mucerino (our newest parish staff member). On a personal note, it is this sort of involvement, and the unexpected assistance by our parish community, that fills me with gratitude. The collective effort exemplifies what Cardinal Cupich describes as co-responsibility for catechesis, when he encouraged us to "embrace the common vision of our ancestors in the faith: the responsibility for the Church belongs to each one of us."

More sacramental and faith formation events are planned for next year, and the help of parishioners and parents is always welcomed. I will be putting out a call for volunteers and would welcome your support.

Step-by-Step Walk Through the Mass Do This in Remembrance of Me, Part 20: Gospel By FR. LUKE SPANNAGEL



For many of us, the Gospel is one of our favorite parts of the Mass. We get to hear the stories about Jesus and the Apostles, how Jesus worked miracles of healing, and the words that he taught. For many, it is easy to imagine the scenes in our minds as we listen to the words. As the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* states, "The reading of the Gospel constitutes the high point of the Liturgy of the Word" (*GIRM*, no. 60). The Second Vatican Council teaches us that the Gospels have a special importance among all the books of the Bible because they are "the principal witness for the life and teaching" of Jesus (*Dei Verbum*, 18). According to Charles Belmonte, the proclamation of the Gospel "emphasizes the union between the Incarnate Word, the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity, symbolized by the altar and sacramentally present after the Consecration, and the word of God written in the Gospel" (*Understanding the Mass*, p. 91).

The Meaning of the Gospel

What does the word Gospel mean? The glossary of the Catechism defines Gospel as "[t]he 'good news' of God's mercy and love revealed in the life, death, and resurrection of Christ. [...] The Gospel is handed on in the apostolic tradition of the Church as the source of all-saving truth and moral discipline" (*CCC*, Glossary, "Gospel"). The four Gospels are named after their human writers: Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. The Second Vatican Council teaches, "The Church has always and everywhere maintained, and continues to maintain, the apostolic origin of the four Gospels. The apostles preached, as Christ had charged them to do, and then, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, they and others of the apostolic age handed on to us in writing the same message they had preached, the foundation of our faith: the fourfold Gospel, according to Matthew, Mark, Luke and John." (*Dei Verbum*, 18).

During the Mass, after we stand for the Gospel Acclamation, the priest or deacon begins with that familiar dialogue: "The Lord be with you!" and the people respond, "And with your spirit!" Then, the priest introduces the Gospel and the people respond, "Glory to you, O Lord!" These back-and-forth dialogues help us to prepare for what is about to happen: the Lord Jesus speaking to us. Another preparation for the words of Jesus is a simple gesture of a sign of the Cross. As the priest or deacon says, "A reading from the holy Gospel according to...," he will make a sign of the Cross on the Gospel book. At the same time, the people at Mass trace a small sign of the Cross on their foreheads, lips, and chests. I still remember, as a young boy, my dad teaching us to make this gesture and to say to ourselves: "May the words of the Gospel be in my mind, on my lips, and in my heart." Those words have stayed with me through the years and are still a sincere prayer that the Word of God would be at the forefront of my daily living. As the Diocese of Peoria teaches, these acts and prayers are all "signs of veneration for the Word of God proclaimed to us in the holy Gospel. Our standing, our singing the Alleluia, our gestures and our responses are all outward signs of our inward disposition of love for Christ and reverence for his Word" ("A Study of the Mass," p. 8).

Our Response to the Gospel

At the conclusion of the gospel passage for a particular Mass, the priest or deacon says, "The Gospel of the Lord!" Our response in faith is, "Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ!" Then, the priest or deacon kisses the page he just read from and says silently, "Through the words of the Gospel may our sins be wiped away." Charles Belmonte beautifully writes that "we can at least make ours the kiss the priest has placed on the sacred book. With it, we want to tell our Lord we are ready to give our lives for the truths contained in the Gospel... At the same time, we ask forgiveness for our faults" (*Understanding the Mass*, p. 95).

Of course, the Gospels are so wonderful that we should read and pray about them more often than just at Sunday Mass. The life of Jesus is so rich and beautiful and can really provide great strength for us every day. Maybe try reading just one chapter of the Gospels every day and see what happens!
